MARCH 2024—LETTER FROM PASTOR DAVE

Hello Friends,

Whether I like it or not, every four years politics claims central stage in my attention for a brief time through two events that take place in the same year, and 2024 is such a year. One being the general election in the United States where we select a president and vice-president, and the other the General Conference of the United Methodist Church where we select how we will present our Church to the world. In both cases politics will be the driving force in the process, and as a result common sense and reason will take a backseat to those with the loudest partisan voices who will take the wheel in the media and in other forms of public communication as well. The thing is politics is not a sport where one can cheer for one side over the other and then go home counting a win or a loss in the statistical records and with the words of the coach in your mind “we’ll get-em next time.” (although I often hear the practitioners of politics refer to it as being a “blood sport” and in many ways it is that). Politics as practiced in these arenas is not about a choice concerning which side one will be on in the battle between right and wrong - good and evil. It is the business of negotiated power and control over the lives of people who live within certain boundaries or under certain authorities. It is the work of parsing power out among the few to rule over the many. When it comes to the gaining or losing of political power in this regard there is no such thing as a common morality by which one might judge the ethical approach of one side or candidate over that of the other, or one policy position over that of another. If I did have to use a game to describe politics as practiced in the United States and church today, I would choose “Capture the Flag.” If you have never played this game, it is played on a large field with a lot of people broken into two teams. Each side has a flag that they need to defend at all costs. The goal is to protect your flag while trying to capture the other team’s flag and get it back to your side. If your flag is captured, you need to stop the opponents from getting it to their goal and return it to your own. It can be and often is a brutal game. If you play it right you do not come out of it without some bruises, and I once cracked a rib playing it. If you are to win in this game, everyone must be loyal to their team, and as a team use a strategy of deception and misdirection to your advantage. There are no complex rules to this game and certainly no concern about ethics, it is all about winning. Such is politics and it is no different whether it is the fight for control of the government or the Church. I have seen myself as being more of an analyst of the efforts of the political actors in the Church in particular. An analyst does not have to take sides, however, invariably has a general affinity for one side over the other as none of us is completely objective on any subject or issue. If there is a side to take,

I have always said I am on Jesus' side. This of course can be used as a means of simply avoiding the issues. Not so many years ago one could choose not to make public statements or even take a side regarding where they stood on political issues whether in the secular world or within the church. But in today's world those for whom politics is their religion, and for whom taking a position on the various social issues is their Doctrine, neutrality is not permitted. Indeed, they have phrases such as "silence is violence" or "not to take a side is to take a side." Depending on those with whom you associate, or what you might state as an opinion, or the likes you make on social media posts you are placed on one side or the other and thereby become an ally or a foe. If judged a foe the only success for the other side in dealing with you is when you are metaphorically left "knocked down in the sand bleeding and out of the game." Something that happens in a rough game of Capture the Flag all too often. I have and will continue to use the language of the Bible, and the words of Jesus in particular, as my means of stating my beliefs. I am of course only human, as the saying goes, and my sarcasm and skepticism toward those for whom politics is their religion will occasionally slip out. I do after all have opinions concerning the events and issues of the day, but in my own small way I do try to keep those personal opinions out of the pulpit and strive to keep them to what I yell at my TV screen while watching the news, or in the occasional comment that might slip out in conversations around the table on a Wednesday morning. What I will say is what I saw on a bumper sticker once, "I am Christian and I vote," and in the tradition of the greatness of the United States, "it is none of your business for whom."

Please pray for this nation and the UMC as we enter this year of nonstop political propaganda that will dominate what we see on the TV in the form of commercials and in so-called independent news programs, and in other forms of media, social or otherwise. Pray that the Truth that is Jesus Christ will be that which gives all of us direction in how we might vote, if we so choose to do so, whether that vote be made in the ballot box, or in where our feet take us, or where our funds go. For me there is truly only one side in any religious, social, or political issue and that is Jesus' side. Snicker if you like, think of it as a means of escapism if you like, think of me as a foe if you must, but be sure that on this "ebenezer" I stand. (In Hebrew ebenezer means "stone of help")

May God Bless us, and keep us in His care in these days of societal and religious division and intolerance,

(Matthew 27:29)

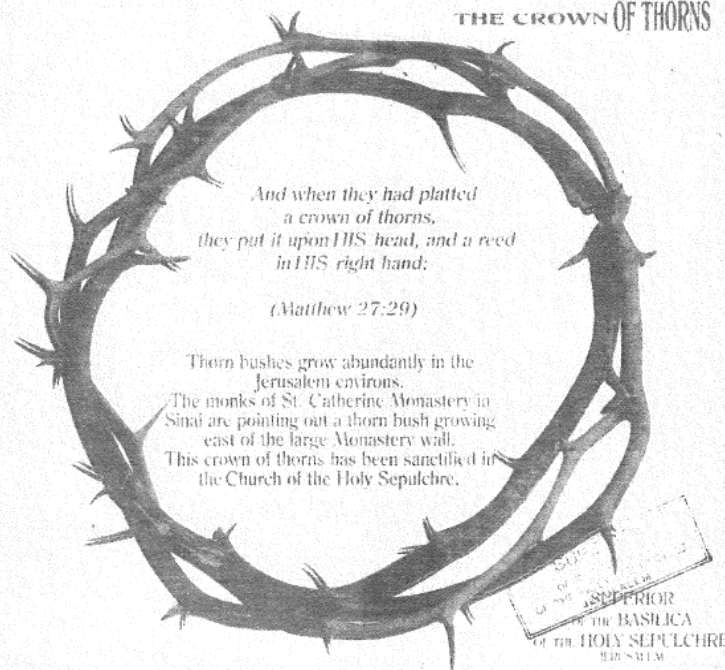

It appears that the days of feeding 700+ are behind us, but we find more and more that it is the involvement of our church and community friends that make this event worthwhile. The donation of pies by so many make this a true church wide event. And we have people from the area show up to help as they enjoy the spirit of serving the meal.

Thanks to donors: Robertson Orchard for the apples to make the sauce, Rod Krueger for the potatoes, Stauber Electric for a cash gift, and, again, all the pie bakers.

Our Lumberjack chairman is Louis Burlo, who called our meetings, recruited workers, and watched over the details of the meal. Louie has been at the helm for several years, and knows "all the pots and pans." Our cooks are critical, and they began their prep work on Monday, were in the kitchen at 6 am on Tuesday to meet the meat truck, spent the day cooking the meat, and returned on Wednesday to begin the preparation for serving the meal. We had about 15 people peeling rutabaga and potatoes and cutting the cabbage. Don Heinrich, past head cook who turned his "tools" over to his helpers, showed up each day to check out the crew. We appreciated the presence of Adam Haen who came from Madison to help slice the meat, our "gravy guy" Doug Meyers, and others who gave special assistance.

It was fun to see a number of younger people working and running take-out meals to those waiting in cars. On the Saturday before the meal, I walked into the church to deliver supplies and found the kitchen filled with "young ladies" baking pies under the direction of Mark Holey and Sandy Smith. They were having fun, and the kitchen smelled awesome. And Rod Krueger and his carry-out crew have their system running smoothly, keeping traffic moving steadily.

And thanks to all who sold tickets: several men sold 20 or more; and to all of you who purchased them. Supper number 89 will be January 30, 2025.

MARCH 20224 MISSION:

Door County Habitat for

Humanity: Since 1994, the mission of Door County

Habitat for Humanity has been to provide decent and affordable housing. Habitat works with existing homeowners to complete repairs they would otherwise be unable to afford or accomplish on their own. They are required to pay for the cost of materials used in a home repair project. New home owners are provided with a low interest-rate mortgage and are required to put in so many work hours during the new home construction build. Door County Habitat for Humanity provides a hand-up, not a hand-out to current and future homeowners.

The most recent Habitat home build meets all Sturgeon Bay residential housing requirements: 1200 sq ft, 3 bedrooms, 2 baths and an attached garage. The home was built with volunteer and homeowner labor. Construction began in May 2023 and was completed in November. Volunteers worked every Tuesday and Thursday with a dozen or more volunteers participating each work day. Altogether, 35 different volunteers donated approximately 3100 volunteer-hours to complete this home.

The homeowner Abigail Newman will visit our congregation on Sunday March 10th. She is excited about her new home and thankfully said "Habitat has allowed the purchase of a home that would have otherwise been unavailable to me and my son. Having a solid, stable place to call home is incredibly healing".

AN INVITATION: Submitted by Paul Schumacher

We use invitations to introduce our friends and relatives to new and interesting events and experiences. An invitation is a form of sharing that we found something good and we want to share it with others. We never know where an invitation may go, or where it may ultimately take our lives. This message will address our inviting others to church, the first step in their possible faith journey. As Christians, we have marching orders from Jesus to make disciples of all. Recall that in Matthew 28, we read: *"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."* That very first time you invite someone to join you at church is the tough one. They may turn you down – if so, accept it, but consider asking again when they might be ready. Let's say they accept, and join you in church. What then? With any luck and faith, you've planted the seed and the person or people liked what they heard and felt in church. We think of this as the first step, or **"come and see"**. This is the first invitation we should be giving to someone who is seeking Jesus, an invitation into relationship with us, where we have the chance to demonstrate who Jesus is. For the invitee who came to church, the next step for the visitor in their journey is to **"Come and Be"**. Jesus provides a good example of what this entails. When Jesus gave the invitation to follow him he let them know that the invitation demanded that they be changed into fishers of men. We read from Matthew 4: *"And he said to them, 'Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.'"* This process took place with Jesus training them using a combination of teaching and modeling. When we enter into a discipling relationship with someone, we model for them what it looks like to spend time with Jesus as we exhibit his characteristics. **Faith** is critical to our ministry - it is the foundation of Christian living. To help us **witness to others**, we rely on the Gospel which describes the sacrificial death and physical resurrection of Jesus for Sins. The gospel is a powerful revelation of redemption. If you know that the Word of God will accomplish what God wants it to, and if you know that the gospel has the power to save, then in witnessing, you are using two very powerful tools. As our guests become more and more familiar with living a Christian life, the third step involves **"come and do"**. Jesus gave his disciples a chance to take the things he had modeled for them and put them into **practice** while he was there to observe them. Our come and do step may include inviting the person to usher, help serve Holy Communion or other people-related tasks in church. Later, when we see a problem or people in need in our community or congregation we may invite input or suggestions from the person we are discipling to give them a chance to put principles into practice and give us some insight into the depth of their maturity and where they may need to grow. After step 3, the invitee should be matured in the church and scriptures. Its time to have the person start the process of discipleship themselves. For example, towards the end of his time with the disciples, Jesus began to send them out without his *physical* presence, but in his name. When they returned he had opportunity to talk through what had happened and give them further feedback and training. This was an important part of the discipleship process then, and it still is today. We need to train the people we are disciplining to put their trust and confidence in God, not on us. It is important they have an opportunity to come back and *debrief the experience with their disciple* – so that they can determine if there is anything they should have done differently. These 4 steps, when given, received, and acted on – will help people move through their faith journey towards spiritual maturity. It will lead them to learn through **both** teaching and experience, and allow them to develop their own relationship with God who both sends them out and goes along with them. These points should help you gain confidence and the tools you need to invite someone to church and into a relationship with God. You plant the seeds and Jesus waters. He works with and through us. It is his Word and gospel that accomplishes salvation. Start by inviting a friend or relative to church. Perhaps invite a stranger that you meet to church. After all, the harvest is plentiful and we laborers are few.
